FROM THE PRESIDENT

This year we presented some very interesting historical topics and programs to the membership. It began with an outstanding presentation by Dianne Fitzpatrick, a descendant of the Lenni Lanape Tribe that inhabited the land from Hazlet to Brielle. This presentation was followed by a presentation from Fran and John Drew regarding the "Brielle Bridge" and its importance in history. We also had another successful Antiques Roadshow.

The Decoration / Memorial Day celebration featured a presentation by United States Coast Guard Executive Petty Officer Zachary Gray from the Manasquan Inlet - Shark River Stations. In this presentation we learned of the history of the Manasquan Inlet Station and the dedication of the men and women of the Coast Guard to protecting the residents and visitors of Brielle and neighboring towns while on the waterways in the area. Many of the Coast Guardsmen were given awards for bravery, including a Medal of Honor recipient. This event was then followed by another exciting program arranged for Flag Day that included a presentation by Borough of Brielle Historian John Belding on the history of the flag of the United States.

The conclusion of the summer brought our participation in Brielle Day, including our famous sarsaparilla and vintage soda and pumpkin bread sales, followed the next day by our 9/11 Memorial Ceremony, which was not only outstanding but was the best attended thus far.

OCTOBER GENERAL MEETING - GUEST SPEAKER JOSEPH BILBY

On Sunday October 30th, local author and historian Joseph Bilby gave a very informative and impressive presentation to members and guests of the ULHS on his latest book, "The History of Submarine Warfare Along the Jersey Shore".

This book describes and illustrates the early development of the submarine. The First American submarine sank off Fort Lee, New Jersey in 1776, and the first successful one adopted by the U.S. Navy was invented by Paterson, New Jersey's John Holland at the end of the nineteenth century. Those early vessels were tested in the Passaic River and on the Jersey City waterfront. Today, the only surviving Union Civil War submarine, built in Newark, is on display at the National Guard Militia Museum in Sea Girt.

For a wonderful history lesson do yourself a favor and learn more about this interesting subject by getting a copy of Joe Bilby's book - you will not be sorry. It will make a wonderful stocking stuffer for that special historian on your Christmas list. The book is available at Manasquan's very own book store BookTowne on Main Street.



9/11 MEMORIAL SERVICE

Every year since the 9/11 Memorial Site was established in 2004 the Historical Society has held a program to remember the tragedy of September 11th, 2001 and to support the sixteen families from our local community who lost a love one that day. At our 9/11 ceremony this September 11th we came together to remember one of those lost souls - Dr. Fredrick Rimmele III, son of Marilyn and Fred Rimmele of Brielle. Donna Disimile was the Master of Ceremonies and led the service.

At this year's service we had participation by Boy Scout Troop 63, the Girl Scouts, the Brielle Recreation Department, the Brielle Volunteer Fire Department, and Brielle Mayor Tucker Nicol. Deacon Gary Pstrak from Saint Denis Church gave both the Invocation and Benediction at the service. Brian Heiney from the Manasquan High School marching band played Taps at the conclusion of the ceremony. The service was very well received by an overwhelming crowd of over 100 people.

MONMOUTH COUNTY ARCHIVES AND HISTORY DAY

Once again the ULHS of Brielle participated in Monmouth County's Archive and History Day at the Monmouth County Library headquarters in Manalapan. Monmouth County has hosted Archives and History Day for 20 years in an effort to connect the public with archivists, historians and other preservationists. The event gives attendees the opportunity to view many interesting presentations from museums, historical societies, universities, parks, and related organizations across Monmouth County and the State of New Jersey.

This year's theme was transportation in New Jersey, and specifically in Monmouth County. Keynote Speaker Paul W. Schopp, Assistant Director of the South Jersey Culture and History Center at Stockton University, discussed the famous Blue Comet Train. This train ran between Jersey City and Atlantic City, stopping at a number of towns in Monmouth County, and was in service from 1929 to 1941

The Historical Society's booth was very well received, with many visitors throughout the day. We were able to share the history of Brielle and sell several books on the topic. Special thanks goes to Ann Scott for once again baking many loaves of delicious Crane House pumpkin bread, which were all quickly sold benefitting the Historical Society.

First Street is now Brainard Place

Second Street is now Forrest Road

Back in the early 1930's Route 70 was a continuation of Route 34

Highway 4N, also formerly known as State Highway, is now Route 71

HISTORIC OSBORN BURIAL GROUND

During the restoration of the Osborn Family Burial Ground we were able to discover and restore 20 of the 21 missing or broken headstones of the then known graves. However, we did fail to locate the complete headstone of William Henry Bailey Osborn, a six year old boy who died in 1852. There did remain a small section of this gravestone with about 12" above the ground. The graveyard committee made a decision at its yearly meeting this past September to replace that stone with a new one. Fortunately from a previous inventory we have the exact wording of the inscription. This new gravestone has been ordered through H.T. Hall, and I am very pleased to tell you that Ruth and George Harms insist they wish to cover the cost, for which we are most grateful. We are hopeful to see delivery before the end of the year.

9/11 MEMORIAL SITE

The 9/11 Memorial Site on Riverview Drive in Brielle was established in 2004 through the efforts of Dr. David Du Pre. The Union Landing Historical Society of Brielle's 9/11 Memorial Site Committee is responsible for the oversight of the maintenance of the Memorial Site in coordination with the Borough of Brielle, and for recommending any enhancements deemed appropriate. This committee has a Project Manager as its head, and four Trustees, representing the Memorial Site's major stake-holders: Victims' Families, Fire Department, Boy Scouts, and ULHS.

Earlier this year, after many years of dedicated service, Dr. DuPre relinquished his responsibilities as Project Manager to Deacon Gary Pstrak, who has worked very closely with Dr. DuPre in overseeing the Memorial Site in the past. Deacon Pstrak has continued to do a wonderful job in overseeing the Memorial Site.

THE BRIELLE ROAD "GLIMMER GLASS" BRIDGE

The Board was recently approached by members of both the ULHS of Brielle and the Squan Village Historical Society of Manasquan to ascertain the Historical Society's willingness to support the effort to preserve the Brielle Bridge, a very unusual and rare historical site. You may not be aware that this bridge is the last remaining vestige of a rolling counterweight design for a "Bascule Bridge" not only in the United States but in the world. As such it is of great historical interest and significance requiring preservation.

The Board of the Union Landing Historical Society reviewed the history and the requests and agreed that we would also submit a recommendation to the Monmouth County Board of Chosen Freeholders for the preservation of this unique landmark. A similar recommendation had already been submitted by the Squan Village Historical Society .
