Please take a look, and let us know of any suggestions for further improvements, and we welcome the support of anyone who would like to help update the website.

New Jersey's 350th Anniversary: New Jersey celebrates its 350th anniversary this year, and Second Vice President Gordon Reinauer, as chair of the Special Events Committee, continues to focus on Society activities to join in the celebration. One such activity was the Society's annual essay contest for 8th grade students at Brielle Elementary School. In honor of New Jersey's anniversary, this year's topic was, "What do you think life was like in Brielle 350 years ago in 1664?" I am very pleased to announce that more than 70 essays were received, and Caroline Davidson was selected as the winner. She received a \$150 prize and read her winning essay to everyone at the Society's Memorial Day Ceremony.

Sarsaparilla: Sarsaparilla is definitely back!! The Historical Society will once again participate in Brielle Day, including the sale of Sarsaparilla and other soft drinks, so be sure to come to the event thirsty! #### **BITS & PIECES**

Our Society continues to press forward in a number of historically exciting ways. We have recently identified in our archives a number of maps, surveys, drawings from the past, the oldest being a hand-drawn survey dated 1685-1715. These items encompass various portions of present day Brielle. We will create removable clear overlays of these old documents to be positioned over the current Brielle map to illustrate road and land ownership changes over time. A United

States Department of Commerce Geodetic Survey of Brielle will serve as our accurate base map. If you would like to participate in this interesting challenge, John Belding would be pleased to hear from you. A project of equal excitement is also under consideration. Bill Bersey owner of a small drone aircraft will experiment in taking aerial views of certain structures and places in Brielle. The first will be an overhead filming of the Schroeder Mausoleum in Greenwood Cemetery. Bill

contemplates adding audio commentary to his filming. Even more, you will recall we have compiled a 22 page "walking tour" covering 39 identified historic sites and structures in town. A written narrative is included for each stop. Through Bill we will construct a "geocache" program to precisely pinpoint each location through a smart phone which will be especially helpful in those instances where a structure is no longer extant. This should particularly appeal to our younger citizens. - John Belding

Within this ceremony was a celebration event for the 350th Year Anniversary of New Jersey. A beautiful background for the cemetery was provided Knockout Roses newly planted by Dylan Lembo, a member of the Boy Scouts, and a group assisting him from his Boy Scout troop.

Fred Rimmele, Chairman of the event and 1st Vice President of the UHLS, opened the Event with a presentation of the Colors by a contingent from the 250th Brigade of the New Jersey National Guard. Troop 63 of the local Boy Scouts of America then led the Pledge of Allegiance, arranged with the help of John Pierciey, Committee Chairman of the Boy Scout Troop.

Local Pastor Louis La Fazia of the Church in Brielle then gave an Invocation, followed by Mayor Nicol of Brielle, who offered wel-

coming remarks to the audience.

The program was underway with Curtis Porcello, ULHS President, presiding. He welcomed the group assembled on another beautiful, sunny Sunday in Brielle.

John Belding, Borough of Brielle Historian, continued the program with a very interesting speech on how the Borough of Brielle has recognized and honored local citizens that fought for the country since the Borough's inception in 1919.

At the conclusion of John's speech, Mr. Porcello and Mr. Belding awarded the Society's annual essay contest prize to Caroline Davidson, an eighth grade student at Brielle Elementary School. The essay contest topic this year was, "What do you think life was like in Brielle when New Jersey was founded 350 years ago in 1664?" This topic was selected as part of the celebration of the 350<sup>th</sup> anniversary of New Jersey. Ms. Davidson read her essay to the audience, and was very well received.

A topic that has long been connected with Memorial Day is the poppies that are given out by the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), which are available locally through the VFW Post #1838 in Manasquan. The ULHS is always happy to support the VFW in this effort. Joseph Media, Senior Commander of the VFW Post, gave a detailed explanation of the history of the VFW Poppy, and explained the many ways how donations provided for the poppies help veterans.

Detachment 1319 in Manasquan. She gave a very moving speech about the freedom and the blessings we have here in the United States of America, with a particular focus on the American Flag and what it represents. In her speech she described the horrible living conditions she endured in the Middle East while fighting for her country. She went on to speak of other aspects of her service in the Middle East during war time leading up to freeing the Country of Kuwait. She spoke passionately about the restrictions that disallowed the American flag being flown where she was stationed with her fellow Marines and how it bothered her so very much. She later spoke of how it made her feel when they were finally able to fly the American Flag — and the strength that it gave her and her colleagues. It was a very powerful speech that made all in attendance better understand the importance of our armed forces, and what the American flag represents.

To complete the ceremony, a boy scout played taps and representatives from the Daughters of the American Revolution laid a wreath at the grave of Lieutenant Abraham Osborn, a member of the New Jersey Militia during the Revolution War. Refreshments, including home-made cookies and chocolate covered pretzels, were served after the event by UHLS Board member Gail Herbert and UHLS member Donna Marie Disimile.
