The Historical Society participated in several events throughout the third and into the beginning of the fourth quarter of 2014. Board meetings were held in July and October. Thanks to the strong support of our members and volunteers, it was an extremely successful day. Later in September we held our 9-11 ceremony that was well attended and described by many as "very moving". Finally, there was Archives Day at the Monmouth County Library Headquarters in Manalapan where we had an informative and interesting display that included many pictures of Brielle, as well as information on its past. The Historical Society plans to host two more events before the year reaches an end, including a general membership meeting in November and a holiday party in December - I hope you are able to attend both. Answer: On July 7, 1881, a group of businessmen formed the *Brielle Land Association*, and purchased 150 acres of farm land between Longstreet's (or Debbie's) Creek and mud pond to be divided into lots for sale as vacation home sites. The development was named "Brielle" upon the suggestion of one of the group members who had visited Brielle, Holland the year before and thought this area resembled the country side and the coastal towns in Europe's low-lands on the North Sea and the English Channel.

selves as time goes by. There is also a narrative describing in some detail the restoration work accomplished to "restore" a thoroughly compromised site. In addition there is an explanation of the source of the antique bricks utilized in the walkway. Our new sign was not inexpensive and is stated to be water proof and unaffected by damp conditions. Our constant challenge is to recognize that restoration of a historic site is desirable and acceptable but in doing this we have accepted the responsibility of also maintaining the site.

Archives Day The Union Landing Historical Society of Brielle was among the 63 archives or historical organizations represented at this year's annual Archives and History Day – held Saturday, October 11, 2014 at the Monmouth County Library Headquarters in Manalapan, New Jersey.

The event was extremely well organized and included several programs and events that even a novice historian would find interesting and informative. Each exhibitor's table was unique and displayed memorabilia about the town they represented, which varied from old photos, maps, and artifacts to calendars of yearly events.

The event started at 10:00 AM with the Color Guard, Pledge of Allegiance, and National Anthem. The Monmouth County Clerk, M. Claire French opened the ceremonies. Some of the awards and programs included Jack and Angel Jeandron from the Keyport Historical Society receiving the Jane G. Clayton Award. Renee B. Swartz, from the Monmouth County Library Commission reviewed and showed the video: *"Four Score and Twelve Years: A History of the Monmouth County Library"*. Monmouth County Historian Randall Gabrielan and Joe Becton conducted a Discussion of Civil War History.

One of the most interesting and memorable programs was the "*Music of the Civil War Era*" presented by Joseph W. Becton of Philadelphia who is an educator, historian, tour guide, and musician. Mr. Becton formerly served as Park Ranger Supervisor at Independence National Historic Park and Director of Visitor Services at Historic Fort Miffin, and is cofounder of the 3rd Regiment United States Colored Troops Civil War Re-enactors.

The Union Landing Historical Society of Brielle exhibition table included the "Down Memory Lane" photos from the Brielle Day contest, both editions of the Brielle Historical books, and several photos of Brielle. The main attraction exhibited on the table was a copy of a very large photo of the manta fish weighing more than 5,000 pounds and measuring more than 20 feet wide, which was caught in the anchor line of a fishing boat at one of the Brielle marinas in 1933. Brielle Borough's Historian John Belding was on site explaining all the exciting details of this great event, which everyone found astonishing.

In addition, during the week of October 6th at the Monmouth County Library there were several other interesting programs and lectures pertaining to the Civil War that were available to those who were not able to attend the event on October 11th. Everyone
