## From the Holmquist Files... **THEY KEPT THE HOME FIRES BURNING**

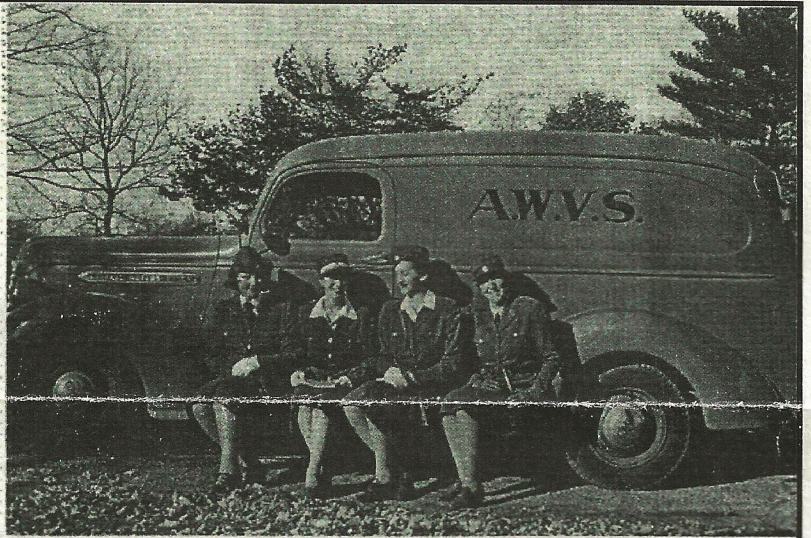

During World War II, the women of Brielle and surrounding towns did their part in "keeping the home fires burning."

Although many women took jobs in factories, etc., to replace the men in service, many others put their efforts into volunteering. Members of the American Women's Volunteer Service organized young people in salvaging metal and other wanted materials, trained members of the community in Red Cross classes, provided motor transportation and acted as black out wardens at night.

The Brielle unit of the American Women's Volunteer Service opened a servicemen's club on Ashley Avenue with ping pong, cards, books, games, refreshments and whatever would create a homelike atmosphere for men in our country's service. Weekly dances were held there. In December, A. W. Dorrer, owner of a local food market, donated a Christmas tree which club members decorated. Sometimes dances were held at the Manasquan River Yacht Club.

The women in the American Women's Volunteer Service proudly wore the uniform dictated by the national organization as they went about their many duties. These women showed the world that American women were not soft and helpless, but were able to contribute to the war effort to help our beloved country.



During World War II women played a large role in a volunteer effort for those on the home front. These unknown members of the Brielle chapter of the American Woman's Volunteer Services provided weekly dances and canteens for soldiers along with teaching Red Cross and acting as black-out wardens.

Helen Holmquist, author of *The Brielle Story* and mother of Richard Holmquist, had a great interest in local history, which inspired her daughter-in-law, Natalie Holmquist, to start collecting newspaper clippings, articles and notations from various sources about the early days in this vicinity.

It is now listed in the New Jersey Points of Interest publication and also on the Points of Interest Map published by the Advocates for New Jersey History. This is a segment of the Wayfinding Initiative sponsored by Celebrate New Jersey. It is pleasing to note the Society's efforts to restore and preserve this graveyard have been met with approval by the professional historical community of our state.

### History Book Committee

The ULHS is currently under contract with The History Press of Salem, MA to publish a new book on the history of Brielle. The new publication will be a comprehensive history of the Borough from the earliest known Indian settlements to the present day. It will be illustrated with photos, maps and drawings, but it will not be a picture book with captions like our last book. Already the committee has selected 85 images for publication, most of which have not been previously published anywhere. We are working on the final revisions of the text prior to submission to the publisher. Our deadline stands at February 13, 2009 and I anticipate we will be working on the draft actively until then. We are anticipating a release date of September 12, 2009 - Brielle Day. This will coincide with the 90th anniversary of the incorporation of the Borough and the new book will definitely include more new information on the reasons for and the process of our Borough's formation.

### 9-11 Memorial Garden

Once again the South Monmouth 9/11 Memorial Garden in Brielle became the beneficiary of an Eagle Scout project. This time the project was initiated by James Patrick Mulligan, brother of Andrew Mulligan of Riverview Drive who completed his Eagle Scout project three years ago at the same site. At that time Andrew designed and brought to fruition a semi-circular planting of shrubs partially surrounding the flag pole and added two garden benches adjacent to the Necrology stanchion. Following up on Andrew's project, James planned to protect the garden plantings from being trampled upon by erecting a seven-section post and rail fence behind the row of arborvitae and interspersing rose bushes along the fence. At the same time he designed and erected a large sign at the upper end of the site identifying the tract as the 9/11 memorial site.

An Eagle Scout Court of Honor was held at the Curtis House on the evening of December 29 at which Eagle Scout Candidate James P. Mulligan was recognized. Oldest brother, Glenn, also an Eagle Scout, gave the Scout Oath while brother Andrew conferred the Eagle Charge. Scoutmaster Frank Hines presented the Eagle Scout Award, with mother Mary Anne, again pinning another of her sons. Edna Black and Karen Rock of Troop 156, Howell, presented the Eagle Neckerchief and Patch. Brielle's Mayor Thomas B. Nicol read a Proclamation recognizing Eagle Scout James Mulligan's accomplishment and declaring December 29th as James Patrick Mulligan Day in Brielle. Following a few words by James' father and benediction by Monsignor Ladzinski of Bay Head, the ceremony adjourned for a reception.

Ann Scott has served from 1981 till the present. Mamie Moon served during the years 1985 through 1998. Virginia Gould served 1999-2000 and Gina R. Murdoch served 2002-2005.
